Alexander Berry, our Director of Music, led a session on Music at Great St Mary's during a recent PCC Away Day. Here is a summary of his talk.



Great St Mary's is a place where the Christian faith and the arts come together with extraordinary creativity. For me, it is a privilege to be part of a major church in which music is so deeply cherished. This was exemplified by our recent giving appeal to raise funds for the Assistant Director of Music post, which was met with great enthusiasm and commitment. Thank you all for your contributions. Surrounded as we are by churches and college chapels offering worship of a very high quality, it's easy to assume that what we do is normal. However, what we do and what we are is far from normal: we are one of only a small number of major churches in England employing a full-time Director of Music; we have more children involved in our music programme than many cathedrals; and we sustain a demanding musical life using volunteer singers at a level that most churches can no longer manage.

At the recent PCC away day, we reflected on what it means to be a major church from a musical perspective, focusing on three areas that feel particularly important at Great St Mary's right now: what it means to be a distinctively Christian music department; how we understand inclusion; and what excellence looks like in our context. We felt it would be important to share some of these reflections with the readers of eMag.

What happens on Sunday mornings and at major services represents only a small part of what the music department does each week. In Cambridge city centre there are several professionally run children's choirs, all connected to colleges. But we are the only one rooted in a parish church, and that makes ours different. Our music is offered as part of worship that proclaims the gospel publicly in the heart of the city, and does so as the University Church. There is therefore a clear missional intent to what we do.

Excluding the Junior Choir, over fifty children are involved in our choirs each week, contributing to five — and sometimes six — choral services. These weekday services are not an optional extra. In a society that is increasingly secular, it matters that children are immersed in a rhythm of prayer in which God is part of daily life. These services also help draw parents, siblings and families into the life of the church, gently growing worshipping communities beyond Sunday morning.

Alongside rehearsals and services, we offer a programme of Christian formation for every section of the choir, providing children with a space to engage with theology, ask questions, and explore faith without pressure. Exploring music and faith together is a vital part of our calling as a major church, and something I feel we are now doing increasingly well.

Great St Mary's is also part of the Inclusive Church network. Inclusion is a priority for Great St Mary's, but it needs careful thought in a context like ours. From the outside, a music programme built around auditioned choirs can appear exclusive. The assumption we need to challenge is that inclusion must mean everyone doing everything. Instead, our aim is to offer a meaningful singing opportunity at every level.

At Great St Mary's, this ranges from choirs for those who do not read music, to unauditioned and auditioned ensembles, to ambitious come-and-sing projects. Not everyone will sing in every choir, but we want to ensure that everyone who wants to sing should be able to offer their voice in the service of God.

St Augustine is often quoted as saying, "He who sings, prays twice." What he actually wrote was *Qui bene cantat bis orat* — "He who sings well, prays twice." Over the past two and a half years, I have spent a great deal of time reflecting on what singing well and excellence in worship look like for us. Music in worship does something visceral. At its best it can comfort, unsettle, teach, delight and deepen prayer; at its worst it can distract. Like good preaching, good music in worship should reflect the readings and aid the liturgy. Our location, resources and extraordinary pool of talent mean we aim to offer one of the finest parish church music programmes in the country as part of a rich liturgical life. At Great St Mary's, all the ingredients are in place for an artistic life that is both daring and prayerful. I am deeply grateful for the stewardship, encouragement and trust that make this possible.

New Bishop of Ely Appointed



On 27 January 2026, Downing Street announced that His Majesty the King has approved the nomination of the Right Reverend Sarah Clark, Acting Bishop of Durham and Suffragan Bishop of Jarrow in the Diocese of Durham, for election as Bishop of Ely.

Bishop Sarah says of her appointment: *"I feel such a sense of joy, vocation and thankfulness to God about coming to the Diocese of Ely. I am deeply honoured by this opportunity to serve as your Bishop and I am so looking forward to joining you, getting out and about throughout the whole diocese, hearing your stories and learning from them and about the communities you love and serve."*

Welcoming Bishop Sarah to the Diocese, Bishop Dagmar adds: *"The Diocese of Ely warmly welcomes Bishop Sarah. I am excited by the leadership, energy and vision she will bring and I am very much looking forward to her joining us."*

Bishop Sarah was educated at Loughborough University and before being ordained worked as a civil servant within the Department of Employment. She trained for ministry at St John's College in Nottingham, before undertaking her curacy at St James Porchester in the Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham. She was ordained Priest in 1999. In 2002, Sarah was appointed Rector of the United Benefice of Carlton-in-Lindrick and Langold with Oldcotes, and from 2009 she served as Team Rector of the Clifton Team Ministry in Nottingham. In 2011 she became an Honorary Canon of Southwell Minster while also taking on the additional role of Dean of Women's Ministry. From 2014 she served as Archdeacon of Nottingham before being consecrated Bishop of Jarrow on 27 February 2019. She took on the responsibilities as Acting Bishop of Durham in early 2024 following the retirement of the former Bishop.



Funeral Plans

Many people find it helpful to think about their funeral wishes well in advance, and to talk to their family about this, or to a member of the clergy. Baptism and Confirmation at Great St. Mary's

If you have been thinking about baptism for you or your child, please, let us know. Adults who are baptized also prepare for confirmation, and we will have a confirmation service at Great St Mary's on Sunday 17 May. Young people and adults who have not been baptized already can be baptized at the same time as they are confirmed.

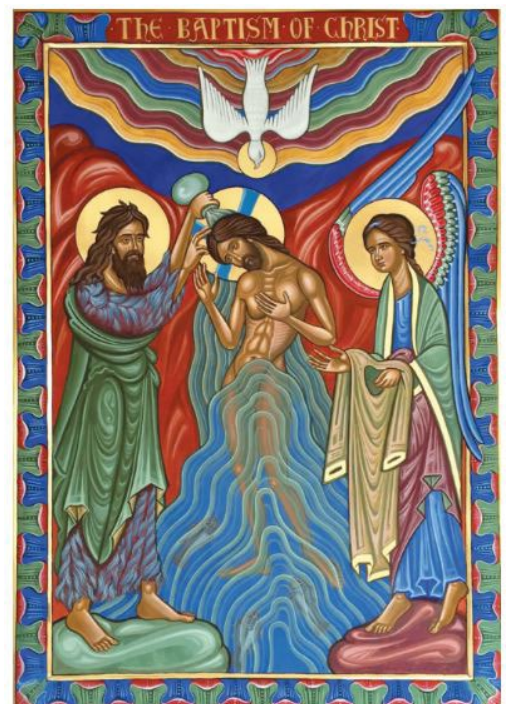
Baptism is both a sign and a sacrament (an act through which Christians believe there is an effective spiritual change) of commitment to the Christian faith. If the baptism candidate is a child, the commitment extends to the prayerful oversight of their parents or carers and godparents. Baptism is when the worshipping community welcomes the person being baptized into the family of the church.

Confirmation is a service during which people who were baptized as a child can make an affirmation of faith for themselves, and this affirmation is confirmed (blessed) by the bishop. It's also possible to be baptized and confirmed at the same service. At GSM we offer preparation sessions for those who are considering confirmation which are intended to be an opportunity to explore your faith with others. These will take place during the 2026 Lent term.

If you are considering baptism or confirmation for yourself or your child, then please do contact Jutta, Ally, Clare or Rosie (clergy@gsm.cam.ac.uk) to learn more about what this involves and how we can support you/them in terms of preparation.

Great St Mary's Godparents

All children who are baptized require 2-3 godparents who have been baptized (in any Christian church of any



denomination) and who are prepared to commit to praying for that child as they grow up. Over time, godparents might end up being closely connected with their godchildren in terms of this prayerful oversight which very often becomes a source of mutual joy between godparent and godchild. There is no expectation that godparents have any other responsibility for the child such as financial support or guardianship.

Cambridge City Council wants your views on our Biodiversity Strategy's mid-period review and on a new Urban Forest Strategy. Trees, habitats, wildlife and climate resilience are closely interconnected. Many of the most important challenges facing the city, including climate change, extreme heat, access to nature, development pressures and community stewardship, cut across both strategies and cannot be addressed in isolation.

CCC's current [Biodiversity Strategy](#) (2022–2030) pledged to undertake a five-year review of actions and progress to ensure we continue to collaborate with partners and communities to protect, manage and enhance nature in the city.

The Urban Forest Strategy sets out how trees across Cambridge will be managed, protected, planted and cared for over the next 10 years.
