

A journey through Holy Week

In the Middle Ages, pilgrimage to the Holy Land, specifically to retrace the steps of Jesus in the last days of his earthly ministry, was the pinnacle of spiritual devotion, but it was an inaccessible dream to most faithful people. Spiritual practices such as following the *Stations of the Cross* became a way for those who could not make such an arduous journey still to follow in Jesus' footsteps in their minds and hearts. The liturgical pattern of Holy Week invites us to do the same, immersing ourselves in the emotional and spiritual journey to the cross, and beyond.



We invite all of you to participate in the journey through this most crucial week for our faith.

Palm Sunday morning (13th April) places us in the excited crowds as Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey and invites us to wonder what sort of King this might be, and how we might understand the hope of salvation that he offers. Within that same service, the dramatic reading of the Passion narrative seems to show that hope disintegrating in a story of betrayal, injustice, denial, and cruelty – it's a catalogue of human sin, which Jesus takes with him to the cross. The music and poetry in Stainer's *Crucifixion* later that day are another invitation to participate in heart and mind in that same journey. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week, offer some time and space to think and pray. Morning Prayer at 9am continues, and on each day there is half an hour of silence at noon, followed by Holy Communion at 12.30pm.

The priest and poet Malcolm Guite is our guest preacher for Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day. The Maundy Thursday service brings another rise and fall in the emotional journey: we join Jesus' disciples sharing bread and wine at the Last supper, giving thanks for the promise of Jesus' ongoing presence with us in the Eucharist. We re-enact his prophetic act as the one who came not to be served, but to serve, as he washed the feet of his friends – even Judas, who would betray him, and

Peter, who would deny him three times. Then follows the Vigil of the Watch in St Andrew's Chapel, until 11pm, when we watch and pray in the hours of darkness, in the presence of the consecrated bread and wine.

Good Friday (18th) is the most solemn of all days; we begin at noon in silence and then the beautiful poetry of Malcolm Guite will shape his *Preaching of the Passion* for us at 12.30pm, followed by the Liturgy of Good Friday, when we venerate the cross and consume consecrated bread from the night before. From now until the first Eucharist of Easter there is no sacrament in the church, as we ponder Jesus' death.

On Holy Saturday (19th), we make the Easter garden and ensure that the children in our community have a chance to explore the Holy Week and Easter story for themselves, and in the very early hours of Easter Day itself (20th) our celebration of the resurrection begins before dawn, with the vigil (readings that tell the story of God's new life) and the lighting of the new fire, and the most joyful celebration of the Eucharist. This year, we will also be celebrating baptisms, confirmations and reception into the Church of England for those from our own Church community and neighbouring churches who have been preparing during Lent. Bishop Martin Seeley will preside and preach at this service. Breakfast follows, then the 8am BCP Holy Communion, and another chance at the 10am service to renew our baptism vows, break bread together, and to be inspired by Malcolm Guite's preaching, followed by Mattins. Multiple celebrations through the morning remind us that the resurrected Jesus met his friends as they gathered: in the garden, in the upper room, and (as we will hear during Eastertide) on the road to Emmaus, and on the shore of lake Galilee. I pray that we will encounter Jesus afresh as we walk together this Holy Week journey to the cross and beyond.



Chorister Experience, an open afternoon for children aged six to eight to find out more about being a chorister at Great St Mary's. As the children took part in fun musical games and rehearsed together with the choristers, parents and carers listened to talks given by Alex Berry and Ally Barrett and observed an open singing lesson of two of our older choristers given by Helen Groves. The chorister parents then hosted a lovely tea during which parents were able to ask questions and get a feel for what makes music at GSM so special. At the end, we all joined together to hear the choristers and participants sing a beautiful

evensong, including Felix Mendelssohn's 'Lift thine eyes' from Elijah. It was the first time in recent years that GSM has hosted an open event for choristers, and it was great fun!

Voice Trials at Great St Mary's (29 March and 19 April)

Children who are interested in joining the choir are able to sign up for an informal audition, known as a 'Voice Trial', which take place on Saturday 29 March and Saturday 19 April. We are currently recruiting children who will be in Years 3 and 4 from September 2025. We typically take 3 boys and 3 girls in each year group. Voice trials consist of two parts: an informal audition with Alexander Berry (Director of Music) and Helen Groves (Vocal Coach), and a short conversation with the Revd Ally Barrett (Associate Vicar

What to prepare for a voice trial:

Prospective choristers should prepare an audition piece. This should be something they can sing well, and ideally should have a piano accompaniment. If in doubt about what to sing, we recommend children learn the first verse of Away in a manger.

After singing the audition piece we do some range and aural tests. The aural tests include singing individual notes and melodies back, clapping rhythms, and finding notes in two- and three-note chords.

We will also ask prospective choristers to read aloud a simple passage of text. If there's time, there may be the opportunity for the children to play a piece on an instrument, if they are learning one.

What to expect:

Voice trials are meant to be informal. We are looking for children who show enthusiasm, have great potential, and are willing to commit to the choir long-term. If your child doesn't play an instrument yet, that's no problem. We know that auditioning can sometimes be scary, and we try to make the auditions as fun and low-pressure as possible.



On **Saturday 19 April**, Holy Saturday, there is going to be an activity morning for children at Great St. Mary's, from 10:00 until 12:00. All are very welcome! Children will be able to help make the Great St. Mary's Easter Garden, and make Easter Gardens of their own to take home. There will be other craft activities too, and a time to mark the day in story and song. We will have tea,



coffee and hot-cross buns a-plenty!

If you have flowers growing at home, and your children would like to (and have your permission to!) cut some to bring for the Great St. Mary's Easter Garden, that would be lovely! But it is by no means required! The activity morning will be most suitable for children aged 3 and above, but younger children will be very welcome too. All children must be accompanied by an adult.

GSM Electoral Roll - PLEASE READ

New Electoral Roll for the Parish of St Mary the Great with St Michael, Cambridge

Every six years, we have to assemble an entirely new electoral roll, in accordance with Church Representation Rules. 2025 is such a year. Everybody who wishes to have their name on the new roll must apply to be enrolled. Joining the Electoral Roll is also a way of showing your support for Great St Mary's and to participate in the governance structures of the parish, if you wish to do so, as it is the register of lay persons who are eligible to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and to stand for election to the Parochial Church Council (PCC). Electoral roll forms need to be returned by **30 April at the latest**. This year's APCM will be held on Sunday 18 May, and the new roll must be completed by then.

Church Rules require us to follow a very specific timetable, which will start with the display

of a formal Notice in Great St Mary's and in Michaelhouse on Tuesday 11 March 2025. Applications, which can be made on paper or electronically, must be in the form specified. From 11 March a copy of that form can be accessed via a button on the home page of our website www.greatstmarys.org and there will be paper forms available in GSM and in Michaelhouse. The new Electoral Roll will be published on Friday 2 May, online and in hard copy in Great St Mary's and Michaelhouse. It will show names, but no other information, and must remain on display for at least 14 days prior to the APCM. Only those whose names are included in this new Electoral Roll will be entitled to stand for election or to vote at the APCM.

We hope that you will renew your membership of our Electoral Roll, or join for the first time. Please do not hesitate to contact the Electoral Roll Officer, Joanna Womack, or speak to the clergy, if you have any questions. It is really important that we gather together on the new Electoral Roll the names of all those who wish to exercise their rights in the Parish.



As a Foundation Governor myself (at Park Street School), I would encourage anybody interested in the education of young people to consider this rôle. Governors are responsible for strategy, rather than operations, and support the school in ways which link to their particular interests. For a Foundation Governor this particularly means checking that Collective Worship and RE requirements are fulfilled but also getting to know how the school works and how it relates to its community. It usually involves a couple of meetings per term plus a possible extra one to check the budget (!) and if you are available to visit at least once a term during school hours it is helpful. It is not necessary to have a background in education as a variety of skills is helpful and you will

find yourself working alongside an interesting group of people - or that is what I find anyway. Why not give it a try?
